In our Summer newsletter, my friend and fellow Board member, Yirga Belachew, reminded us that it is important, now more than ever, to be a good neighbor by showing kindness and having an attitude of service. That is so right! With kids back in school and holidays in sight, we now look ahead at a season of thanks and giving, both of which also make for a strong sense of

community. Always be thankful for what you have and for the people in your life! The last several months have shown us how precious those close to us can be – especially when they cannot always be close to us. Remember to give when you can. It doesn't always have to be something that costs money. You can give a smile, an uplifting word, some of your time, or so many things that just take an effort. Sometimes, you can also give the gift of flavor...

The season is changing and Fall is in the air! For many, outdoor grilling will decrease. Ovens, crockpots, and pressure cookers will smell up the kitchens. I'd like to share with you this old Louisiana chicken recipe my friend gave me. Make it and share it with your neighbors and loved ones!



Opelousas Baked Chicken

This is a famous Opelousas dish. The secret is in the seasoning and the long, slow basting process. It is often served with rice dressing, petit pois, candied yams, green salad, and French bread. Here's what you'll need:

- 4 chicken fryer halves
- Tony's Creole Seasoning and/or salt & pepper
 1 small can paprika
- 1 cup chicken fat or oil

- 1 cup water
- 1 teaspoon chili powder

Season the chicken generously with Tony's Seasoning or salt and pepper. Rub well on each side. Place fryer halves in an open baking pan and cover with a mixture of oil/chicken fat and water. Place pan in a preheated 275° oven and cook until hot. Sprinkle generously with paprika and chili powder. Baste continuously every half-hour until dark brown. Takes from 3 to 5 hours. Deliciously serves four.

The common area at Aaron Drive and West Oak Highland Drive that contains the community playground and tennis court has a valuable new addition! Thanks to a generous gift by Alexis Drive neighbor and former Board Member Cathy Midkiff, the children and families of Oak Highlands and Deer Valley now have easy access to a variety of books very close to home. Mrs. Midkiff bought a "little library" for our community as a memorial to her late husband, John. The John Midkiff Memorial Library was installed on August 22, with a set of books loaded in that day, and has already seen much interest. This is a little library, similar to many you now see in residential areas, that follows the "give a book, take a book" format and allows individuals to borrow a book to read nearby or to take home and keep. Remember, there are benches in the tennis court and playground areas where you can sit and read anytime, as well as in other spots around our subdivision.

Those who have books to spare, or would like to buy a few for the collection, are asked to place them in the little library at any time. The focus of this library is fiction and non-fiction books for kids - whether board books to read to babies and toddlers, simple storybooks for preschoolers, short stories for early readers, or longer stories and multi-chapter books for older kids. Any contributions to the library will be greatly appreciated! Mrs. Midkiff and the Association will maintain the library box and make sure it stays appropriately stocked at all times. We cannot thank her enough for this kind gift to our community, and we are sure that Mr. Midkiff would appreciate the joy being brought to our neighbors in his name.

Neighborhood Watch Needs YOU!

Recent events in our community have reminded us of the need to strengthen our active and efficient Neighborhood Watch. The group of volunteers who commit time and effort to keep our neighborhood safe in Deer Valley and Oak Highlands are a great asset. We appreciate each and every one of them, BUT we need more of them! We need YOU to join this effort to protect your home and your neighbors' homes.

Who should join? A resident of Oak Highlands or Deer Valley (whether you own or rent your home) should volunteer for Neighborhood Watch if they meet any of the following: if you have been a victim of a crime and want to prevent similar crimes; if you want the children of our community to have a safe place to play; if you have one or two spare hours per week; if you care about your property value; if you have a phone and an e-mail account; if you are an adult and are able to walk or drive throughout the entire neighborhood, at least, once per week. Basically, anyone should join! Please, don't delay – join Neighborhood Watch today!

The two primary roles to play as a Neighborhood Watch volunteer are:

*Neighborhood Patrollers – These individuals travel throughout the neighborhood (usually on wheels, but sometimes on foot) during designated times of day or night to be on the lookout for irregular, unsafe, or suspicious activity. They report things that need to be reported to police and, over time, recognize patterns of activity that may need to be on notice with the police or the Association. A basic patrol round through the neighborhood by car only takes about 45 minutes. Those who choose to walk it find it a good way to exercise! This is a great way to get to know the neighborhood better and provide a valuable service to others. Volunteers are reimbursed for the mileage of each standard patrol round and will be provided magnets for their vehicle. Some volunteers do rounds before or after work or during times of day or night when they are normally at home. Ideally, we need at least 3 rounds occurring over each 24-hour period. Interested volunteers can pick their day/time and become part of the team now!

*Block Captains – These volunteers serve as a point person for their own subsection of the neighborhood – a block or street or section of a street (depending on the location). They keep an eye on their area; being alert for irregular, unsafe, or suspicious activity; and make efforts to get to know the neighbors in their narrow locality. It is helpful for Block Captains to provide their contact information to those neighbors to establish a communication network and serve as a local conduit with our Neighborhood Watch efforts.

Ideally, an active Neighborhood Watch volunteer will fill both roles. But, we need and appreciate anyone actively participating in either role. Neighborhood Watch is not a police force, and does not directly intervene in dangerous situations. We seek to keep the Police Department and Hawkins Management informed about immediate and/or ongoing concerns that deserve attention. 
